📗 Dear Church,

As the Easter season begins, here's something to contemplate, courtesy of Philipp Nicolai, a pastor and hymn writer in the generation immediately after Martin Luther: What is the use of eternal life? Having been given so great a gift in Jesus's death and resurrection, to what end is this new life directing us? With our righteousness and justification before God secured by Jesus's cross, Body, and Blood—what now? To paraphrase another great theologian and a seminary professor of mine, Craig L. Nessan, from justification and the promise and joy of eternal life

grows vocation—our calling out into the world. And the sole focus of that calling is to love our neighbors. It's as simple... and as complex as that.

Because loving our neighbors can look so deceptively simple. Many of us love neighbors every day who look like us, speak like us, think like us—even reside in the same house as we do! And the home is, indeed, where neighbor love begins. But as we go out into the wide world, we will encounter plenty of neighbors who are nothing like us—neighbors who think differently, who live differently, who may even be antagonistic to us. And yet, these ones are our neighbors, too. And in all that we say and do to our neighbors, we are preaching Christ's Gospel. That is our vocation, first and foremost.

Now, what does all this have to do with the promise and gift of eternal life? With that promise, we are freed from all the strictures that would hold us back from loving our neighbors: race, ethnicity, political party, religion or lack thereof. We are freed from worrying about our personal holiness before God. We are freed to live lives of service to and for neighbor. And indeed, we are freed to see that the Kingdom of God in the life of the world to come is the reconciliation of all things— all neighbors—in God, by Jesus Christ, through the power of the Holy Spirit. As Philipp Nicolai writes: "We would learn to guard ourselves against all ungodly hatred, envy, enmity, and devilish works, which are contrary to love and belong not in heaven but in hell. [...] Who loves God and neighbor and grows and increases in such love leads a life of paradise one Earth and has a heavenly conduct, even though still making the pilgrimage and journeying in the flesh." Neighbor love is the Kingdom of God—both now and to come. And assured of the Kingdom to come, we are freed to work here in the Kingdom now, that it might resemble the one on the way.

The Kingdom, again in the words of Craig Nessan, becomes "the Kin-dom." Welcome to it. With a Mighty Shalom,

that would like to join us! This will be a week filled with space themed fun and fellowship as we learn how to shine Jesus' light throughout the world!


Again this year we will be offering a lunch to all participants so we are asking for a \$10 donation for each participant but the donation isn't required for attendance.
