Dear Church,

Recently, I listened to an eight-part podcast titled "The Unmarked Graveyard: Stories from Hart Island." The podcast told the story of New York City's "potters' field" on Hart Island in Long Island Sound, just off the coast of the Bronx. Hart Island is the final resting place of more than one million people who either could not otherwise afford burial, could not be identified at the time of death, or who had no next of kin to claim the body. The cemetery on Hart Island is also mobilized in times of emergency, such as the 1919 Spanish flu pandemic, the AIDS crisis of the 1980s, and more than two thousand people were buried on Hart Island during the 2020

Covid pandemic.

Burials on the island are simple. Bodies are placed in pine coffins and stacked five deep in trenches. There are no headstones, only concrete posts marking sections. The burial records are fairly meticulous, stretching back to the first interments of soldiers during the American Civil War. Only in the last year, however, has the public been granted access to Hart Island, and even then, only in a limited capacity to go to a loved one's burial section.

It sounds like a sad story—a million created, beloved souls resting there, many known only to God. Sadder still is the thought that, in life, many of the people buried on Hart Island certainly had a rough go of it: that addiction, homelessness, mental illness, despair overwhelmed them to the point that they died alone, isolated, unwanted, or believing themselves to be unworthy of love, compassion, support. For we who believe in the resurrection life, who have been given faith to know those million on Hart Island are desired by God for eternal life, how might that change our outlook on beloved community? For we who do not grieve as others because we have the certainty of resurrection, how might we think about the lives, even hear the testimony of those buried on Hart Island? How will we greet them, and they us, in the life of the world to come?

Would it move us with compassion to work as the resurrected Body of Christ that we are to see that this life might more closely resemble the life of the world to come—where all are fed, clothed, housed, and seated around the celebration of the unending feast, Jesus at the center? When we think of the day when we shall all be arrayed around Christ's table, made new, of course we will all be welcomed. How can we be just as welcoming as a church with that guaranteed future, to those who so desperately need to eat, to be housed, to hear the Good News of Jesus Christ?

As our Vitality Initiative cohort enters into a new phase—thinking about our neighbors and our community, these are questions we are encouraging everyone to think about, and we will be having more conversations about just this in the near future. But it's always something we as Christians have at the top of our minds. God's peace be with you, now and always!

Vitality Initiative for Congregations Many thanks to those who have shared stories and helped create the video for our first leg of the Vitality Initiative here at North Branch! In the next phase, after we have been pondering who we are as a church, we are thinking about our neighbors. Who makes up the community around us? We are a diverse group! At last look, we have 17 different towns or cities on our postal rolls, and we have young people attending from six different school districts. We cast a wide footprint here at North Branch, perhaps one of the widest in the Nebraska Synod. Going forward, we want to explore what it means to have membership so spread out—what challenges and what opportunities we might have with that diversity. And North Branch has a pretty good foothold in those communities, helping to provide food, clothing, and other assistance.
