Dear Church,

I thank my God every time I remember you, knowing the Holy Spirit has brought us together for such a time as this!

Over the next few months and years, you may be hearing even more about how the Spirit is leading us to be the Body of Christ to one another and to our wider community. This past month, a group of North Branch members have been invited into a Nebraska Synod program called the Vitality Initiative for Congregations (VIC). Over the next two years, we will be meeting monthly with churches around our Synod and pondering how and where God is calling us next.

God's mission has a church, not God's church has a mission. And in that spirit, the VIC is going to help us, as a thriving, giving, rural church, to listen to the Spirit's guiding and leading. How is God using this church to further God's mission? With a new pastor and new opportunities like the Cass County Fair Stand, a growing youth and education program, and a congregation attracting more families—we are marveling at these walls of water that God has pushed to either side of us and giving thanks for seeing this day. And, we are also excited about what wonders are to be found on our successful crossing.

In the weeks and months ahead, you will be hearing more about the VIC, and we will be seeking your prayers, meditation, and input as we all listen to the voice of the Holy Spirit, pulling us into the Body of Christ, and animating our journey to a Promised Land overflowing with love of neighbor and service. In the meantime, I ask your prayers for the VIC team: Morgan Brunsting, Justin & Marci Gartner, Chuck Gubbels, Teresa Lorensen, Jill Nosal, and Josh & Amanda Stubbendick. Thanks to all for their service!

We look forward to this experience as our church—which has been abundantly blessed passes on our blessings to other churches, our community, and also learns where we go from here.

It has been an exciting year in our church this year! So far in 2023 we have celebrated one year with Pastor Adam and family, we had our largest VBS ever, and successfully served lots of pies at the Cass County Fair. We have a lot of exciting things happening and I'm looking forward to seeing where God leads us in this next year.

You may have noticed in the bulletin or in the newsletter that our expenses have been outpacing our giving in 2023. We've had a lot happening over the last year or two that has contributed to more expenses. We've called a full-time pastor, have an active Sunday School program, and many other things happening in our church. As of our last council meeting, we have about a \$12,000 deficit between giving and expenses in our current fund. Unfortunately, this deficit has continued to grow each month in 2023. In our discussions at council, it has been brought to our attention that with so many newer and younger members it would be good to go over what each category on the offering envelopes means. You'll notice that there are three categories on our envelopes. Far left is Current, middle is Benevolence, and the right column is for designated giving. Below is a summary of what each of those categories means:

Current: This is giving that stays within our church and goes to our "current" account that is used to pay expenses for the church.

Benevolence: This money is paid to the Synod for administrative expenses and other programs within the Synod.

Designated: This column is used to designate your giving to a specific place. This can be used for outreach that we support (i.e. missionaries, Lutheran disaster relief, local food pantries, fair stand, etc.) or for 2nd Mile Giving such as our ongoing shed project.

Our church council has been looking closely at our expenses and trying to help lower those any way that we can. Last month we were able to speak with a few vendors to lower monthly bills. We've all been feeling the effects of inflation and higher costs this year. We have always had such a generous congregation that has supported our church. I am asking us all to pray about our church as a whole and our personal giving and see where God moves each of us in the next year.

I am so proud of everything our church has accomplished in the last year and how much outreach we have done in our communities and am looking forward to seeing what God does with our church as we go forward.

Please join us on Sunday, Oct. 29 following the second service (around 11:45 a.m.) for trunk or treating!



More Fair Stand Updates

Fair Stand Fun Facts

Our Church is Awesome!! Our congregation really stepped up and made our first year at the Cass County Fair a success. The building is paid for and we are already looking forward to next year. All of your contributions, whether by way of prayers, making, baking, cooking, grilling, preparing, or serving food, cleaning before or after, monetary donations, volunteering or buying our "left-overs", all are greatly appreciated!!

Thrivent Funds helped the Fair Stand Committee by saving us \$3,250 toward expenses. A <u>big shout out and</u> thank you Thrivent Members!

Keep Cass County Beautiful had grant money that helped us use compostable materials such as forks, knives, cups, plates and more. Their final statistics showed 3,050 pounds of recycled and composted material that did not go into the landfill this year. This includes 1,040 lbs. of bottles and cans, 820 lbs. of cardboard, 150 lbs. of glass, 60 lbs. of plastic films and 1,000 lbs. of compost (food waste and compostable dinnerware). By using their program and Thrivent Funds, we were able to help our environment and decrease our compostable material expenses by more than \$1,500.

It Takes a Village!! We had tremendous help from so many... ranging from the Methodist Churches in Weeping Water and Elmwood, Cheerleaders, our Youth Group, individuals and families working together, Mick with his trailer, donations for a new refrigerator and 3 new ovens, professional caterers LuAnn and Annette, Pastor Adam and his family, businesses such as Bloom Where You're Planted and Round the Bend Steakhouse, guidance from our vendors/suppliers, and so many more I've probably forgotten to mention (our apologies). To all of you, we are grateful and applaud you.

We did it! We are happy to report that we exceeded expectations in sales. After paying for the fair stand and paying our expenses, we had a profit of over \$6,000, which will allow us to prepare for 2024.

At the Nebraska Synod Assembly, a year-long focus was launched to "Go And..." Be part of this call to GO. During the Synod Assembly, they taught how to lean

Asking questions might sound like such a simple thing, but it is one of the most important skills in life. Personal Care Kits

"When LWR distributes Personal Care Kits, it's often to people who have lost everything. In the wake of an earthquake or having fled from violence as their homes were overtaken, they clasp a towel from a faraway place, with a bar of soap, a toothbrush...and washing up, they know that they have not been forsaken by the world. The simple gesture of giving a Personal Care Kit can give someone the encouragement to start anew, starting with a bath!" What to include:

- 1 light-weight bath-size towel (between 20" x 40" and 52" x 27"), dark color
- 2 bath-size bars of soap
- 1 adult-size toothbrush
- 1 sturdy comb (remove packaging)
- 1 metal nail clippers

School Kits

"Why school supplies? To the children who receive School Kits, these supplies mean the difference between getting an education or not. Public school is usually free, but in the places where LWR woks, even a few required supplies, like pens and paper, may be more than many families can afford. And when parents can only afford to send one of their children to school, girls rarely get priority...yet the education level of mothers has the biggest impact on development." What to include:

- 4 70-sheet notebooks (8" x 10 ½") No loose-leaf paper
- 1 30-centimeter ruler, or a ruler with centimeters on one side and inches on the other
- 1 pencil sharpener
- 1 pair of blunt scissors
- 5 unsharpened #2 pencils with erasers
- 5 black or blue ballpoint pens (no gel ink)
- 1 box of 16 or 24 crayons
- 12 ½" eraser
